Territory Quilts 2015

Categories:

Entries in each category must comply with the criteria set out in the category definition. A five centimetre tolerance is acceptable on quilt sizes. In the event that, in the opinion of the Judge and/or the TQ15 Co-ordinators, a quilt has been entered into an inappropriate category, the exhibitor will be contacted by the Co-ordinators to discuss what action the exhibitor wishes to be taken.

Quilts that do not meet the criteria will not be judged or exhibited.

1. Traditional:

Predominately hand and/or machine, pieced and quilted. It must follow a traditional layout and design. Includes whole cloth quilts.

2. Small Quilts:

3. Beginner Quiltmaker:

A person who has commenced quilting and completed a quilt in the last two years and has not previously exhibited. The quilt can be constructed using any technique.

4. Student Quiltmaker:

The quilt maker must be 18 years or younger on the closing date of (7/8/2015). The quilt can be constructed using any technique.

Size: Maximum size 200cm x 200cm

5. Open: Mixed Technique:

Quilts that incorporate two or more predominant techniques, but not including the quilting. For example: embroidery, trapunto, crazy patchwork, embellishment, painted, felted, etc.

Size: Minimum size 140cm, maximum 160cm

5.1 Individual

5.2 Two person quilt

6. Long Arm Quilters (One person):

Should be traditionally pieced, applique, whole cloth or innovative quilts.

Size: Minimum size 140cm, maximum 260cm

7. Miniature:

Can be of either a scaled down pattern, your own original design, and including postcards.

Size: Maximum size 50cm on any side

8. Art Quilt:

This must be a contemporary original design.

Size: Maximum size 160cm on any side

9. Group or Collaborative Quilt:

This quilt must be made by three or more people.

Size: Minimum size 140cm, maximum 260cm

10. Any other item (not eligible for best of show):

Size: Maximum size 260cm on any side

This can be a table runner, bag, quilt made from a kit, block of the month quilt, other item, or quilt that does not fit into any of the other categories listed above.

Awards

First and highly commended prizes may be awarded in each category.

Bernina Best of Show: (This excludes Category 10)

Bernina Junior Quiltmaker

Bernina Amateur encouragement award: (This is chosen by exhibition committee members)

Top Line Steel Fabrications: Best Use of Colour

Australian Patchwork & Quilting: Retaining the Tradition

Domestic Machine Quilting: One person quilt, quilted on a domestic machine

Long Arm Machine Quilting: Best quilting by long arm machine quilter (New award)

Predominantly Applique: Hand or Machine Applique to more than 75% of the quilt

Judge's Choice: Judge's choice of favourite quilt

The Library Award:

The exhibitor has entered a quilt or other item into an existing category, and has advised on the entry form that the quilt or other item has been completed using a pattern or technique found in a book or magazine in the DPAQ library. The exhibitor must provide details of the book (author, title, etc.) on the entry form.

2. DEFINITIONS:

CONDITIONS OF ENTRY

Please ensure you carefully read these conditions before completing your entry form

1. ELIGIBILITY TO ENTER:

All entrants must be residents of the Northern Territory.

All entries must not have been previously exhibited at any other exhibition including intra-state, interstate and overseas. This also applies to regional and agricultural shows.

The Committee has the right to refuse any or all entries. Acceptance of an entry does not automatically guarantee display of the quilt or other item at the Exhibition.

Each quilt will be entered in one category only.

Entries must have been entirely made by the exhibitor, except for entries in the following categories:-

1. Traditional

Two-person quilt (Both Amateur or Amateur and Professional) Traditional Quilt.

Two-person quilt (Both Professional)

2. Small Quilt

2.3 Two-person quilt (Both Amateur or Amateur and Professional) Small Quilt.

2.4 Two-person quilt (Both Professional).

5. Open: Mixed Techniques

5.2 Two-person quilt Open Mixed Technique

9. Group or Collaborative Quilt

The quilt must be made by three or more people. The exhibitor must be the owner of the quilt and must acknowledge all other makers of the quilt.

Quilts must be submitted complete and in a good clean condition, including free of loose threads, animal hairs, dust and lint. Definition of "Professional":

A professional quilter is defined as someone who teaches or publishes in the field of quilting, sells, and designs or participates in making quilts for financial gain, and/or has won Best of Show or two blue ribbons in any major judged exhibition.

Definition of "Financial Gain":

Financial gain is defined as any amount above the cost of creating the quilt, cost of creating any article, design, teaching aids including samples, notes and travel expenses.

A major show is a State or Territory Guild judged exhibition or competition, a national or international competition or exhibition.

Having exhibited as Professional, amateur status cannot be resumed.

<u>NOTE</u>: This is the agreed definition of the Australian Council of Quilters

Definition of "Two Person Quilt":

A two person quilt is any quilt where another person, additional to the exhibitor, has participated in the making and/or completion of the quilt. Participation includes <u>any</u> involvement at any stage of the quilt making process - cutting, piecing, appliqué, embellishment, quilting and/or binding.

3. NUMBER OF ENTRIES:

A maximum of one quilt per category may be submitted by an individual, two persons, or group.

A separate entry form MUST accompany each quilt.

A non-refundable registration fee of \$10.00 for Members of DP&Q, and \$20.00 for non-members is payable with each entry form.

CONDITIONS OF ENTRY (Cont.)

4. ENTRY FORMS:

Entry forms must be received by FRIDAY 7th August 2015.

They should include:-

Appropriate fees for each entry

A separate entry form for each quilt

Description of each quilt in 30 words or fewer.

All sections of each entry form must be completed in full, including size, description, copyright, etc., and signed. Failure to do so may result in the entry not being accepted.

5. ENTRY FEES:

Entry fees are non-refundable once an entry has been accepted.

Entry fees per quilt are:

Member \$10.00

Non-Member \$20.00

Student \$5.00

Judge's critique fees per quilt are:

Member \$5.00

Non-Member \$10.00

Please ensure that you insert your NAME in the reference details (eg: A SMITH TQ15), and include a copy of your bank receipt with your entry/entries.

ALL ENTRY FORMS AND FEES MUST BE RECEIVED NO LATER THAN FRIDAY 7TH AUGUST 2015.

<u>6. LABELLING YOUR QUILT AND QUILT CARRY/</u> <u>STORAGE BAG</u>:

Please deliver your quilt in an appropriate bag. Plastic or paper shopping bags and tubes are not suitable. Pillow cases or pillow case protectors are ideal. Upon receipt of each entry form you will be given two labels. One will be for the back of the quilt, and the other will be for the quilt carry/ storage bag. The label for the back of the quilt should be pinned or tacked to the bottom edge of the quilt. If you have already labelled your quilt then you will need to cover that with the entry label or with some other fabric (calico, etc.) so that your quilt cannot be identified other than by entry number.

The label for the quilt carry/storage bag should be pinned or tacked to the top centre of the bag.

PLEASE ATTACH A COLOURED PHOTOGRAPH OR PHOTOCOPY OF EACH QUILT TO THE OUTSIDE OF THE CARRY/ STORAGE BAG.

7. HANGING SLEEVE:

To enable hanging, each quilt must have two 10cm (4inches) deep double fabric sleeve <u>sewn</u> to the quilt. No pins. There must be one sleeve at the top and one sleeve at the bottom of the quilt. Miniatures and small quilts are to have appropriate sized sleeves at the top only. Quilts without sleeves may not be displayed.

8. PHOTOGRAPHY:

Darwin Patchworkers & Quilters Inc. reserves the right to photograph, and permit photographs of all items to be taken - for DP&Q archives, for publication, including on the DP&Q website, and DP&Q Facebook page, and for any other appropriate purposes.

All entrants are to be aware that public photography will be allowed during the exhibition.

9. DELIVERY OF QUILTS:

Quilts must be delivered to the exhibition venue (Stokes Hill Wharf Precinct Function Centre) on **Monday 7th September 2015 between the hours of 10.00am and 6.00pm.** Each quilt will be checked for its category and size, etc. on delivery, so please ensure that you allow time for this procedure when delivering your quilts.

CONDITIONS OF ENTRY (Cont.)

10. ROSTER DUTY:

All exhibitors in the exhibition are expected to work a roster period during the exhibition. This may include sitting at the entrance, white glove duties, selling raffle tickets and anything else required by the TQ15 Committee.

11. COPYRIGHT:

All entries in Territory Quilts 2015 are subject to Australian Copyright laws.

What is copyright?

- Copyright laws are designed to protect the intellectual property and creative skill of quilt designers as well as their right of recognition of these skills, while ensuring reasonable access to the quilts by members of the public.
- It is essential that all entrants complete and sign the declaration section of the entry form. If this section is NOT signed, your quilt will NOT be displayed. The following terms will assist you in defining the design course for quilts entered in Territory Quilts 2015.
- Original design applies when no other person has any claim on the design. For example: You can claim copyright on the design if the design is all your own work. You must not have used or been influenced by a quilt, art work, or photograph, of another person.
- Traditional design applies when traditional blocks have been used. For example: Ohio Star, Log Cabin, blocks that are regarded as being "in the public domain". You have however, made the choices of fabric, colour and layout settings for the quilt.
- A version of someone else's design applies if you have followed someone else's pattern but made your own fabric choices and perhaps made variations to the design. You must name the designer and/or publication where you obtained the design.
- Someone else's design applies if you have followed someone else's pattern and fabric choices. You must name the designer and/or publication where

you obtained the design. This particularly applies to kits and Block of the Month designs, where fabric and patterns are provided and used as directed.

- Displaying a quilt that is a version of another person's design may be an infringement of copyright if the original designer is not acknowledged in the display literature and signage. Quilt designers must be given proper credit for their creative works, otherwise it implies that the person who made the quilt on display is the author of the original work and this would be in breach of copyright laws. Making changes, (even 10%) is not enough to make your quilt an original design.
- If your quilt is influenced by the artwork of a quilt you saw in an exhibition or a picture in a calendar or anything over which another person can claim copyright, you should obtain permission for your work to be exhibited. For example: if you make a quilt using the design of a stained glass window from your local church, you should get permission from the church to exhibit your quilt and maybe even from the designer of the window. A copy of this written permission MUST accompany your entry form.

The name of the maker as well as the design source may be published in a catalogue and on display cards for all quilts exhibited.

Trademarks and official logos should not be reproduced in articles for public display. For example: Harry Potter, Disney characters or football club logos are sensitive.

AUSTRALIAN COUNCIL OF QUILTERS CONFERENCE REPORT 2015

Held in Perth (Western Australia) 22nd February - 24th February 2015

REPORT NUMBER 2

Jan Cashion (President and Voting Delegate) and Kim Tait (Committee Member and Non-Voting Delegate) attended the Australian Council of Quilters conference in Perth on behalf of Darwin Patchworkers & Quilters Inc. A lot of topics was discussed which I will attempt to convey to everyone over the next couple of months. If anyone has any questions about the topics, please feel free to give me a call or ask at the next ordinary meeting.

MEMBERSHIPS

Every Guild at the ACQ Conference expressed concern over Membership. The same stories echoed across the room that it was difficult to recruit young members due to family commitments and working commitments. Current Members were getting older and there was a feeling that our craft of piecing and quilting was dying out. Some Guilds agreed, but the general consensus was that the craft would never die and proof of this was the inclusion of modern quilting groups. Modern quilting was attracting younger people as the emphasis was on small projects and making items quickly and simply. It was suggested that Guilds and Clubs need to get out into the community and be seen and known. Advertise workshops in Newsletters, social media and local Newspapers.

It was also interesting to note that all but two Guilds had raised their Membership rates since ACQ 2014. The other two Guilds were in the process of raising their Memberships in 2016. Some Guilds were suggesting introducing a \$10.00 late fee if re-joining after four months and a separate charge of \$3.00 per Member to cover insurance increases. Most Guilds set their membership fees every year to include CPI increases. Some Guilds had had a complete restructure of Memberships with Group Memberships being replaced the individual memberships.

COMMUNICATION

Communication between Guilds and Clubs have improved immensely with ACQ now having a website and Facebook page. ACQ is trialling "Wiggio" which is an online group collaboration software that makes it easy for everyone to communicate and share files in one central place. Within it, multiple channels of communication are available such as email, text, and voice messaging that can be sent en masse to all group members.

Australasian Quilt Convention TRUE BLUE Winners And the announcement of the theme for 2016

The True Blue theme of the 2015 AQC Challenge struck a heartfelt chord with quilters and resulted in a record 98 entries with 35 finalists selected to create a magnificent touring display.

Entries featuring iconic Australians, political statements, explorations of blue in all its hues, blue birds, blue feelings, and blue heelers were among the many clever interpretations of the theme. But there can only be one winner and the **First Prize** accolade went to Queenslander Jeannie Henry's depiction of a commanding blue-winged kookaburra perched on the branch of a iconic Australian gum tree against a beyond blue sky.

Exquisitely executed pieced and dyed background, layers of appliqué, manipulated fabric, machine embroidery and machine quilting, bring the powerful design to life. *True Blue Jacko* delivered a cash prize of \$3500 from sponsor Expertise Events.

Runner up went to Really True Blue by Jan Clark (NSW) featuring the much loved blue wren against an abstract nest. Jan used dyeing, screen printing, thread drawing and machine quilting to create her piece and collected \$1500 in prize-money.

However, two entries were so impressive that the judges decided to award **Honourable Mentions** with a cheque of \$250 each. In *True Blue Mates*, Yvonne Chapman, WA, depicted mateship between a swaggy and his blue heeler dog, set in an Australian bush scene. Yvonne's work also took out the Viewers' Choice award which carried a further \$500 prizemoney.

In Sue de Vanney's composition *Beginning True*, a blue heeler pup is set amidst a background of the Australian outback with iconic images of the landscape in a beautifully flowing design.

Announcing the theme for the 2016 AQC Challenge: Expertise Events is pleased to advise that the theme will be *Tradition with a Twist*. Quilters are invited to start creating now – the size will again be 90cm square and entries are judged on interpretation of theme, design and workmanship.

The exhibition of True Blue quilts will tour the Craft & Quilt Fairs across Australia and New Zealand in 2015. Also touring will be the Lest We Forget display of 116 works which combined to create a moving tribute to the Gallipoli Centenary.
