

Profile of a DPAQ Quilter

Kristina Hewer - thanks for writing about your quilting journey

In 2002 I was depressed having resigned from teaching much earlier than planned due to health issues. With the mentorship of an esteemed teaching colleague Margaret who had retired earlier, I started my first quilt. This was my first really creative activity and saved my sanity. The quilt was for my daughter in-laws 30th birthday and involved 40 friends and relatives who decorating 4 inch squares and large homespun hearts. It was rainbow colours which Ashley and I both love and had my first Friendship Stars.

Next my daughter's 28 year old best friend Caroline died suddenly. So I made quilts for her grandmother and mother (who was my best friend). My need to have meaningful motives meant I had to include disparate fabrics. This started a love of Crazy Patch blocks.

Then my son's 30th. His favourite childhood book was "Where the Wild Things Are" and Frangipani Fabrics just happened to have a colourful monster fabric. Determined to try different blocks in creating Max's jungle world unwittingly I made a kind of sampler quilt. There had to be Friendship Stars!

Grandchildren appeared and I Spy quilts began, always with bright colours and rainbows but... I had to have fabric motifs for every letter of the alphabet.

Next a big, brave move, for me, to join a collaborative activity, making House Blocks. I designed my own Darwin elevated house and did my first appliqué in different colours to suit the twelve participants.

Then I discovered DPAQ's monthly meetings with stimulating Show and Tells and began to joyfully devour the library... from the beginning. Marianne Reilly started Thursday Threads group 9 am to 9 pm so working members could also enjoy the convivial sewing. This has been and continues to be, a wonderfully supportive haven for me where I'm constantly learning.

I'm not particularly confident at sewing, but I have always loved fabric and colour. As an eleven year old I detoured on my way home from school so I could meander through the fabric section of a local department store. I went to a Saturday Stitchers and fell in love with Barb Mellon's teaching of 18" blocks which were designed by someone else, to use up fat quarters frugally. I realised it was a perfect pattern for much fabric playing(not fat quarters) with simple sewing. A friend's 70th who loved flowers, especially orchids, was the first recipient of a colourful quilt using these blocks. I bravely entered it in Territory Quilts 2013.

Two more significant birthday quilts with the same cut pieces but very different arrangements. My joy also is searching for fabrics with motifs specific to recipients interests and there are always Friendship Stars!

My cat Vegemite keenly inspects and certifies each quilt, as with this Jenny Molloy taught Convergence.









Saturday Stitches

PROJECT BAG Requirements list. Saturday November 21st

Note: This Project bag can be made in any size that suits you best. It can be made as a square or rectangle. For something different make a Pieced back, do a Circle of Geese or use an Orphan block.

Requirements for Medium size Bag

3 pieces of 12 1/2" x 12 1/2" for Back fabric, Wadding & Lining

4 1/2" x 6 1/2" fabric for an internal Pocket (optional) Two 4 1/2" x 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ " Strips of fabric for front either side of zip (Can be the same fabric as the Back or contrasting) One 6" x 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ " Strip of fabric for front at the bottom if using mesh

10" x 12 1/2" Mesh (from Dragonfly) or Plastic (Medium weight from Spotlight is the most suitable)

2" x 10" Strip of fabric for a side handle (optional One 16" Zip - Matching or Contrasting to fabric Contrasting Zipper Pull & narrow Ribbon (optional) Sufficient 2 1/2" Binding to suit size of bag (This Bag approx. 60")

Thread – Matching &/or Contrasting (Plain, Variegated &/or Metallic)

Requirements for Large size Bag

3 pieces of 16 1/2" x 13 1/2" for Back fabric, Wadding & Lining

4 1/2" x 6 1/2" fabric for an internal Pocket (optional) Two 4 1/2" x 16 ½" Strips of fabric for front either side of zip (Can be the same fabric as the back or contrasting) One 6" x 16 ½" Strip of fabric for front at the bottom if using mesh

14" x 16 1/2" Mesh (from Dragonfly) or Plastic (Medium weight from Spotlight is the most suitable)

2" x 10" Strip of fabric for a side handle (optional) One 20" Zip - Matching or Contrasting to fabric Contrasting Zipper Pull & narrow Ribbon (optional) Sufficient 2 1/2" Binding to suit size of bag (This Bag approx. 80")

Thread – Matching &/or Contrasting (Plain, Variegated &/or Metallic)

Note: Essentially 4 Fat Quarters will make 1 Bag Your Lunch



Recipe for November

Chick Pea, mushroom and spinach curry - A vegan recipe

Ingredients 1/3 cup of vegetable oil 1 teaspoon cumin seeds 1 stick cinnamon broken 1 large onion finely diced 4 cloves garlic, crushed 250 grams small mushrooms cut in 3mm slices 400 gram can diced tomatoes 1 tablespon ground cumin 2 teaspoons ground coriander 2 teaspoons ground tumeric 1/4 teaspoon dried chilli flakes (to taste) 2x400 gram cans chic peas, rinse, drained 1 bunch coriander chopped 100 grams baby spinach or rocket leaves nan bread to serve (optional)

1. Heat oil in a large frying pan over high heat. Cook cumin seeds and cinnamon for 30 seconds, stirring until fragrant. Add mushrooms; cook until,wilted. Stir through tomatoe and spices.

2. Simmer for ten minutes, stirring occaisionally.,stir through chick peas and coriander, season with salt and black pepper. Simmer 10 minutes longer . Stir through spinach until wilted. Remove cinnamon before serving.




